They have always been an inspiration to me over all these years.

#### **ANNUAL REPORT for the year 2014-15**

*IDA India* was established in October 1996 and in last 19 years we have taken great strides to alleviate the suffering of animals. Today our major projects are as under:

- ✓ Animal Birth Control (ABC) program for street dogs 1200 per month (250 in Mumbai, 550 in Navi Mumbai & 300 in CIDCO, 50 in Lonavala & 50 at other smaller camps whenever held).
- √ ABC Program in smaller towns like Lonavala, Elephanta Island off Mumbai coast.
- ✓ ABC program for street cats 90 per month at Deonar.
- ✓ Other surgeries around 80 per month. like hernia, haematoma, VG, amputation of limbs, tumour, Wound suturing, etc.
- ✓ Treatment to around 150 per month seriously ill / injured dogs & cats brought in by our ambulances from nook and corner of Mumbai, Navi Mumbai & CIDCO regions.
- ✓ Ambulance Service: 9 ambulances, including 4 big vans and 5 smaller vans.
- ✓ Night emergency service for accident / emergency cases, the only such service in the cities of Mumbai & Navi Mumbai...
- ✓ Treatment to 250 dogs & cats per month for minor ailments on the road itself, with our Mobile Clinic (Maruti Omni) equipped with medicines, a qualified veterinarian and a driver-cum-helper. This Mobile Clinic moves in the Eastern Suburbs of Mumbai, and in Navi Mumbai, which helps to reduce the tremendous pressure on the centres.
- ✓ Shelter to around 101 old, blind or handicapped dogs and cats, that cannot fend for themselves on the road. Of these 41 blind dogs are housed in exclusive wards.
- ✓ Water bowls project under which more than 5000 water bowls have been placed in cities of Mumbai and Navi Mumbai, to provide clean drinking water to street animals. This project is also catching up in other cities like New Delhi, Noida, Chennai, Hyderabad, Bangalore, Pune, Jaipur, etc. with 200 to 300 bowls each.
- ✓ Campaigning for rescue of elephants begging in cities, tortured in camps under the guise of training and those dying on the railway tracks running through forests.
- Cows project to help cows tied outside temples or in tabelas (cow sheds).
- Awareness programs for school children to sensitize them about kindness and compassion. The Compassionate Children's Club is an initiative in this direction.

**Employees**: **IDA India** employs a staff of **84 persons** including visiting Surgeons, qualified veterinarians, centre managers, supervisors, ambulance drivers, dog catchers, ward boys and administrative office staff, which enables the organisation to help so many animals as explained above. **Management is by Office Bearers on honorary basis**.

#### Notes:

- Vashi Centre started from 26<sup>th</sup> July 2006 but was closed on 1<sup>st</sup> September 2010. It was restarted at Turbhe from 18<sup>th</sup> May 2011, after a gap of 9 months.
- Neral Centre for horses started from 28<sup>th</sup> August 2006 but closed from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2011.



- Two Mobile Clinics started in May 2005, but one was stopped from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2012.
- Project for large animals in Mumbai started in April 2007 but stopped in April 2011.
- CIDCO Centre at New Panvel started from 21<sup>st</sup> December 2012.
- Lonavala Centre started from 8<sup>th</sup> March 2013.





Note: The number of dogs sterilised have dropped or increased for various reasons, but the numbers have been substantial, whereas cat sterilization has not picked up much, rather it has stagnated and needs a boost. Read about both these later in the report.





Note: The drop in treatment cases from 2011-12 is due to stoppage of our projects for horses and cattle at Matheran and Mumbai.

#### **Total Surgeries**

This describes total surgeries in last ten years, though our work has been going on for last 19 years. These surgeries include: 1) The Spay / Neuter programme for dogs & cats and 2) Other surgeries as explained below.

#### 1) The Spay/Neuter programme for dogs and cats:

**Dogs:** On setting up **IDA India**, the first item on our agenda was 'Dog Sterilization' in Mumbai. With no place to do this, we started off in two small garages at Usha Nagar, Bhandup in March 1997 with 20 surgeries a month. Thereafter we moved from camp to camp until finally with the intervention of the Hon'ble Bombay High Court, we got a place at Deonar from Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai (MCGM) in December 1999. We started this centre on 1<sup>st</sup> February 2000, and also got a new ambulance through a Grant from Animal Welfare Board of India. Thus we could increase our number to 250 dogs per month. The number went on increasing as we spread our wings and went to other regions i.e. Navi Mumbai and New Panvel. Today we sterilize around 1200 dogs at all the centres. Though we have our hands full with 3 full-fledged centres, our heart goes out to dogs in smaller towns where no such program is undertaken and thus we started holding camps in towns like Matheran, Karjat, Alibag, Panvel, Nagothane, Lonavala, Dahanu, Umergam and so on. After strongly pursuing with Lonavala Municipal Council, **Bakul Khatau** managed to get a permanent set up at Lonavala in March 2013. Our latest endeavour to help



dogs in remote regions, is our camps at the Elephanta Caves [Read later in this report.]

Cats: Cat Sterilization is one area that is neglected. Being independent and living quietly by themselves, generally citizens do not complain about cats, so Municipal Bodies do not feel the need to run a Cat Sterilization Program. However curbing cat population is equally important, as the frequent cycles of pregnancies and birth are really traumatic for the mother cat. She undergoes further trauma when her kittens are picked up and dumped elsewhere by ruthless people, while mother cat is crying and searching for them in vain. We give great emphasis to cat sterilization, and have requested MCGM to support this program, but so far there has been no response. Presently we undertake this program with help of volunteers for catching and sponsoring the cat spay/neuter. We started cat sterilization in 2003-04 with 97 cats in a year, but numbers steadily increased to around 700 cats in a year, but this program needs to be geared up as in case of dogs.

#### 2) Other surgeries:

This is an essential part of our activity, and as important as sterilization program, as these life saving surgeries relieve dogs/cats of pain and make their life on the streets better. Hernia, hematoma of the ear, amputation of limb, removal of venereal growth, tumour, cancer of the penis, extraction of damaged eye or digit, prolapse of organs like uterus, urinary bladder and so on, are some such cases. Suturing of the wounds is done in a big way so that wounds do not get infected and heal faster.

#### **Total Treatment**

**Admissions**- Homeless animals living on our streets are always at risk of getting run over or injured due to heavy traffic. Dogs get into fights due to territorial instincts and during mating season, injure each other, and their wounds get infested by maggots. If untreated, their condition worsens. Such animals are admitted at the centres until full recovery.

Besides injuries, gastro, hepatitis, skin infection, ear infection, and even the fatal canine distemper cases need help. *IDA India* endeavours to help the ill / injured animals, but without an isolation unit away from the centres, we regretfully have to refuse admission to dogs with canine distemper, as this highly infectious virus can infect other dogs recovering from other ailments, especially when their immunity is low. We admit several cases of mother dogs/cats dumped outside out gates with their babies, or mothers found in serious conditions and unable to care for their babies. This puts us in a spot each time as space is restricted but we are unable to say 'no' to these type of cases.

**Mobile Clinics** - The treatment cases also include the cases handled by our mobile clinics, with on the spot treatment for minor ailments, so that hospitalisation is avoided.

**Night Ambulance Service** in Mumbai and Navi Mumbai is a big boon to animals that meet with accidents at night due to speeding vehicles as dogs are out looking for food or protecting their territories. Bad maggot wound cases go into hiding during the day and come out only during the night. Such cases earlier would remain unattended until next morning, but are now brought by our Night Ambulances to the centres, given first-aid and relief, until the vets give regular treatment next day. The night ambulances are supported by **Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai** and **Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation.** 

**OPD-** *IDA India's* OPD is a boon to all types of animals, be it dogs, cats, goats, rabbits, donkeys, cocks and even mice, and helps reduce their suffering animals, as otherwise they remain untreated by their not-too-well-off guardians due to cost of veterinary treatment.



Ambulances: Ambulances are the lifeline of IDA India. We have to replace the older ones running on diesel with smaller ones running on CNG, both from point of view of curbing pollution and cutting costs. Our effort was supported this year by Mr. Sunilbhai & Mrs. Anjaliben Shah who donated a Maruti Omni CNG in memory of their dear mother Mrs. Pushpaben Shah. BAYER HEALTH CARE donated another Maruti Omni Cargo CNG as a part of their world wide initiative for improving human and animal health. Their Head of Global Animal Health Dr. Dirk Ehle & Senior Representative of Bayer in India, Mr. Richard van der Merwe handed over the key of the van to Sudnya Patkar & Dr. Makarand Chavan, on 24th November 2014. Pictures of both ambulances on the inside cover!

This year we sold the Tata Pick-up donated by Mrs. Bharati Dubey and a Fiat Uno donated by Mr. & Mrs. Kavasji Warden a few years ago. Both these vehicles so graciously donated, helped us to help innumerable animals over the years, and since they aged considerably and there was lot of wear and tear, so we sold them this year. The funds received have been kept aside in the Ambulance Fund for a new vehicle to be purchased.

#### Challenges faced by us during the year:

Despite all efforts Canine Distemper keeps raising its ugly head in the city of Mumbai. It is heart breaking when animals that come for spay / neuter get infected with this dangerous virus. We sought advice of several knowledgeable persons to control this disease, including Mr. Abodh Aras of Welfare of Stray Dogs, who very graciously came to our centre and advised on how WSD have been managing this disease. Thus effective 1st January 2015. several steps were taken like:

- Separating out the spay/neuter wards from the treatment wards to keep them sterile.
- Staff that handle ill animals prevented from entering the spay / neuter wards.
- √ Stoppage of admissions of even suspected distemper cases.
- ✓ Stoppage of admissions after the vets have left for the day.
- Suburbs with maximum cases reported identified to tackle the situation.

Despite these efforts, a few cases are still reported and it appears that Canine Distemper has now turned into an endemic.

IDA India's Fundraising Dinner IDA India's Second Fundraising Dinner was held on 30<sup>th</sup> November 2014 at Hotel Sea Princess Juhu. The venue was beautiful and the event was very well attended by our wonderful supporters.

The host of the evening was IDA India's Brand Ambassador Film Star Ms Raveena Tandon and the Guest of Honor was famous Film Star Mr. Boman Irani with his wife Zenobia and son Keyose. Both stars arrived at the venue on time, despite Raveenaji being unwell with fever and conjunctivitis, and Mr. Boman Irani having to reschedule his international flight to be with us on time. Both the stars enthralled the audience with their strong views in support of animal welfare and animal rights. They spoke with conviction and from the bottom of their hearts, about kindness and compassion to all living beings, and equal right of animals to share this earth with humans. Mr Sunil & Mrs. Shaila Jhangiani of Chemistry sponsored the event and wine was sponsored by Charosa Wines.

The event was beautifully anchored by Dr. Nimish Shah and Fizzah Shah. The "Chemistry - Champion of Animals 2014" trophy was presented by the Chief Guest to Ms. Christina Lobo Jha and Ms. Goodicia Vaidya, both messiah of homeless animals, and personification of compassion and kindness. The evening ended with a vegan dinner, and each quest receiving a gift bag from IDA India. We are extremely grateful to Raveenaji, Mr.

#### IDA India's run at the Mumbai Marathon 2014

IDA India had a good representation at Standard Chartered Mumbai Marathon 2015 (SCMM 2015) on 18<sup>th</sup> January 2015. There were 21 runners who ran for IDA India and for animal welfare. 19 who ran the half marathon were Prita Pant, Vikas Khatwani, Aditya Mohatta, Jaipreet Singh Saini, Dr. Sourabh Fulmali, Anirudh Shetty, Pranav Tahiliani, Kaushik Rajan, Kanika Uppal, Rohan Mehta, Siddhartha Bhattacharya, Heera Singh, Vishal Doke, Shreyesh Vachali, Tushar Soni, Archana Somani, Dr. Pankaj Jajoo, Swapnil Sansare, and Priyasha Corrie. 2 of our ward boys, Baburao Desai & Amrut Salunkhe ran the Dream Run (6 km). The SCMM is truly an exhilarating and humbling experience with so many people and charities participating! Everything relating to the Marathon was coordinated by Priyasha Corrie and we owe our success entirely to her. Thank you Priyasha!!

#### ABC Camps at Elephanta Islands:

*IDA India* has been struggling for several years to reach out to dogs living on the island of Elephanta Caves, 10 km off the coast of Mumbai, a major tourist attraction for its amazing caves and a small community of local inhabitants. The only way to reach is by sea boats and ferries. Due to tremendous hurdles, our desire to undertake spay / neuter program for these dogs and render treatment to ill / injured ones, remained unfulfilled. It was an agonizing situation knowing that despite being so close, we could do nothing to help them.

In December 2014, we decided to give one more try, so under the stewardship of *Fizzah Shah* and *Goodicia Vaidya*, a few committed animal lovers went to the Elephanta Caves. Their survey found 150 dogs on the island, mostly starved and malnourished, most females were pregnant with wounds and there were puppies all around. Most tourists were not friendly as the dogs follow them in search of food scraps. A project was thus planned, to be executed before the onset of rains in June 2015, when boats to the island are stopped.

Our first spay/neuter camp at Elephanta Island was conducted successfully on 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup> February 2015, when **27** *female dogs* were spayed! Several problems were dealt with; e.g. commute to the island with all the equipment, power supply, (the island gets electricity for only 2 hours in a day), water supply & so on. The local municipal council could not fund this program but were kind enough to provide us 2 large rooms. The head of the council who owns a restaurant provided food for our staff. Thus we got going! We arranged for a diesel power generator, invited *Surgeons Dr. Jinesh Shah & Dr. Zenobia Chinoy* to hold this camp and both very kindly agreed.

Generous donors contributed towards this program and the vets and staff willingly agreed to stay there for a night...in a dilapidated room without electricity. **Goodicia Vaidya** went on the 5th February to settle the staff, organise catching of dogs and prepare for the program and **Fizzah Shah** went on 6th February and stayed through to ensure that all was well.

We take up challenges whenever we can...the animals need that we all move out of our comfort zones and do whatever can be done for them...the dogs here were suffering and so we took up the challenge and the journey has begun! This camp is thanks to the 'never-say-no' indomitable spirit of our *Fizzah Shah* & *Goodicia Vaidya*. Both ladies took pains to see this through! Big thanks to them! *Pictures of our first camp on inside back cover*, one of which shows the vets drawing water from the tube well after the surgeries!! Hats off to you Docs for working in such conditions!

The second camp was held in May 2015 when 19 male/female dogs were sterilized. While at this camp, Goodicia took the opportunity to check out on the female dogs spayed in the



earlier camp, and she was happy to see them all healthy and happy. After the rains we hope to hold further camps, but we are now confident that we can do this.

**IDA India's initiative with AuroJeeva for animal welfare in Pondicherry.** This project **AuroJeeva** was started last year with initiative of **Shonar Joshi & Priti Kuberkar** and wonderful support of **Shanaya & Vijendra Gairola. Sri Aurobindo Society (SAS)** absorbed **AuroJeeva** under its own umbrella, and while **AuroJeeva** is continuing its stupendous work of spay/neuter of dogs in Pondicherry, there is total lack of support from the Pondicherry Municipal Council, which is a setback to the project.

<u>The Temple Cow Project</u>: This project got shelved due to want of dedicated volunteers. The cows tied outside of temples need help and we request volunteers to join the program.

#### Campaigns in Atlanta, Georgia, U.S.A.

**Sarita Raturi** and her group of supporters in Atlanta, continue to organize campaigns for Animal Rights almost every other weekend. A few of them are listed below *[pictures of the protests on back cover]* 

- 26<sup>th</sup> / 27<sup>th</sup> April 2014 the group participated in Inman festival and educated people on Veganism, cruelty free living and other major animal issues. They showed the video "Mercy for Animals" and paid people \$ 1 to watch this one minute video.
- ✓ **Sarita** was involved in getting the documentary/movie "Cowspiracy" screened in Atlanta on 6<sup>th</sup> November 2014. An Environmental movie and a big time eye opener on what Greenhouse emissions are doing to mother earth and farms that raise animals for slaughter contribute towards 51% of pollution problem.
- Week long Protests were held against Ringling Circus in early February 2015. The good news is that finally Ringling has decided to phase out all elephants by 2018. No more elephants in circuses in the U.S. Another circus named Universal circus are already in trouble and *Sarita* was in court as witness to beating an elephant who refused to leave stage after having missed a trick on the stage. He knew what would happen to him back there so the frightened poor thing did not leave the stage. Finally the trainer beat him with his bull hook right in his mouth (very sensitive area) in front of the audience. Changes are coming but slow. Such results are seen due to activists who keep the protests going and spreading awareness on the atrocities on these gentle giants. This has to continue until all wild animals are sent to sanctuaries too!

<u>Water Bowls Project:</u> IDA India's Water bowls project initiated by *Sarita Raturi* and supported by *Sharmee Bhatt* has picked up tremendously. Volunteers, who maintain the Water Bowls on a daily basis, are provided free cement water bowls by *IDA India*. These bowls cemented to the ground at inconspicuous locations, help animals quench their thirst in hot sultry summer. More than 5000 such water bowls have been installed in Mumbai / Navi Mumbai. Besides *Sarita* advises people in Bangalore / Noida / Gurgaon / Delhi, Chenna & Jaipur to start projects there. [pictures of animals drinking from water bowls on back cover].

#### 5 KM Run / Walk...In Defense of Animals at Atlanta Georia U.S.A.

**Sarita Raturi** organized the '5 Km Run/Walk....In Defense of Animals' on 20<sup>th</sup> September 2014 and raised USD 7,500/-. This amount helped tremendously to tide over our perennial financial crunch, and in paying off some unpaid bills.

This was the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Run organized by *Sarita*, with help from her husband *Dinesh* and son *Karan*. It was a huge success with 200+ people participating. Volunteers dressed as a cow and a rabbit, gave away flyers educating masses on animal cruelties and what they can



do to stop them. Ms. India-Georgia 2014 *Ms. Kali Luthra* flagged off Run/Walk. It was a beautiful fall morning with bright sunshine and it was so nice to see so many animal lovers wake up early morning to support our noble cause. As usual the entire cost including T-shirts to runners, refreshments, etc. was borne by *Sarita* herself and the entire collection came to *IDA India*. #### Project envisaged in Current year (2015-16)

#### New Recovery Room & Cat Ward:

You will recall that in February 2014, we had sought support to renovate all the dog kennels at Deonar Centre that were in a horrendous condition. With your wonderful support, we managed to get all the kennels fully repaired. Now it is the turn of cats to get better conditions at Deonar. As you know we started off as Dog Sterilization and Treatment Centre, but gradually ventured into helping cats. We made a small cat ward with few cages for treatment to ill / injured cats. Gradually the inflow of cats increased and we went on adding cages. Then we started spay-neuter of cats, which is essential as explained in earlier part of this report. Gradually that activity also increased. Over a period of time we got a few cats that stayed on with us including 2 blind cats, so we made an enclosure to house shelter cats, and then came orphaned kittens that were rescued, and thus was born our kitten ward.

All these four wards are overflowing with cats, and sometimes we face a dilemma of putting 2 cats in a cage or refusing admission, which is heart breaking, as if we refuse admission they have nowhere else to go. We have thus planned a big cat ward with spacious cat cages, for treatment, spay-neuter, cat runner for sheltered cats and a kitten ward, all close to each other. The only space available for this is the long corridor-type place that we presently use for post-surgery recovery of operated dogs. After recovery, when the dogs go to their respective kennels, this huge recovery room remains empty. We therefore propose to construct a Dogs recovery room separately and convert the present recovery room into a cat ward. The cost of this project is envisaged at Rs. 18 lakhs, as per the quotes received, subject of course to negotiation.

#### Ambulances need replacement:


We presently have 9 ambulances, of which 4 are big vans (Tata 407) and 5 are small vans (Maruti Omni). Most of these vans have become old and need constant repairs. This year 2 small vans were replaced by new ones donated by *Mr. Sunilbhai & Mrs. Anjaliben Shah* and *Bayer Health Care*. In the current year we hope to replace 3 more vehicles, one big van and 2 Maruti Omni vans. This will improve the efficiency of our ambulances and cut down our maintenance costs.

The big van will cost around Rs. 12,55,000/- and the small one Rs. 3,75,000/-.

#### Funds:

In our Annual Reports we have always explained how the funds were received, but this year we thought of explaining how we raised the funds and how we spent it, be it from *In Defense of Animals (IDA)* our Principles, Municipal Corporations for spay/neuter program and our kind and supportive donors from India and abroad. Our detailed accounts are provided at the end of this report, but to give you the situation in a nutshell, our Vice President *Dr. Naina Athale* has developed this lovely diagram:





Those who supported us in our endeavour:

- In Defense of Animals (IDA) continued financial assistance to IDA India so approx.
   14% of our monthly inflow is assured due to this wonderful support. Our grateful thanks to Dr. E. M. Katz, President Emeritus, Ms. Marilyn Kroplik, President & the entire Board of IDA.
- **Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai** funding for ABC program starting from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2007 @ Rs. 300 per dog brought in by Municipal Vans and @ Rs. 450/- per dog brought in by **IDA India** ambulances, suddenly stopped by MCGM for some budgetary approvals. Our request to increase the rates due to inflation is under consideration, but presently we are yet to receive the Grant since January 2014 i.e. for 1½ years. **MCGM** recently released payments of bills for the Night Emergency ambulance that were pending since January 2014.
- Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation has started funding treatment of dogs besides the spay-neuter program as per the new arrangement from 1<sup>st</sup> August 2014. We now render 24x7 service for animals in Navi Mumbai with support of NMMC.
- **CIDCO** continues to fund the dog sterilization program @ Rs. 550/- per dog, but our request to waive clause of free spay-neuter for 30 dogs each month, waiver of water charges and electricity, as also request for increase in rate is not considered so far.

#### Our other donors:

We would like to express our immense gratitude to all our donors, who have contributed towards this cause of animals, as without their support we could not have helped so many animals. Due to constraint of space in the Annual Report, we have published the names of donors who have contributed Rs. 10,000/- or more. We wish to reiterate that we are extremely grateful to all our donors, and absence of their names from this list should not be construed as our lack of gratitude. A special mention needs to be made of *Mr. Jayakrishna Kayalakal*, who requested the guests attending his son's wedding to donate to *IDA India*, rather than bring gifts. He thus raised a sum of Rs. 1 lakhs for *IDA India*. Hats off to Mr. Kayalakal and his family for this wonderful gesture!!

#### Valuable animal caretakers

One morning at our Deonar Centre, I witnessed a very touching scene. An elderly lady made her way to our Blind Ward and as soon as she came close to the gate, a huge very old dog, stood up on his hind legs, making happy noises and wagging his tail to welcome her. He was Raju, 13 years old and she had brought him in as he needed treatment and daily medication. He was all well now and ready to go "home" and the re-union was simply joyous. When I spoke to her, I learnt that old Raju was one of 43 dogs she watched over, fed daily and cared for, not in her very small home, but in the nearby locality. That was my first encounter with one of the precious people we now call as "Caretakers"

They come in all sizes, ages and from all economic levels. They are aware of just how many stray animals live around about their locality and then make it a point to actually care for them in every way. In Powai a busy young lady makes time to make daily rounds and feed / check on her 53 doggy friends, making arrangements with others if she is away. She has given them names, knows their ages, grieves when a very old friend passes away and knows when any new animal comes into the locality. She has involved a lot of people who stay and work in the same area, in keeping watch over the lot. These involve taxi drivers in the taxi parking area, security guards and even Commandos who patrol Powai. This is another example of these precious people.

A lady in Santa Cruz has six pet cats, but as she lives on the ground floor, she keeps open house for other cat visitors. Many visit her place for some breakfast and sometimes 'bed'. In the process, she has got all these friends spayed and neutered and all are sleek, fat and in very good health. There are dozens of them!

We have realised just how valuable they are! There are not many animal welfare NGOs working in this crowded city, with its teeming millions and innumerable vehicles. We cannot be everywhere at all times. This is where these precious Caretakers come in. They monitoring these friends on a daily basis, feed them, are aware of their health, get them spayed-neutered in time with our help and call us when one of them is ill or injured. This type of monitoring spares us a lot of extra work. One important benefit is that all animals become friendly, they can be easily be administered yearly vaccinations.

A recent case that touched us the most was when we had to return a lovely six month old pup back to his locality as he had been brought in injured, and was ready for release. However we could not contact his well-wisher who had brought him in. Finally, we decided to take a chance as when these pups are well and left at the Centre, they can pick up any infection from the daily load of ill animals coming in. Our Manager *Krishna Shenoy* himself went with the pup to the location given. As he got out of the Van and was spotted, holding the pup in his hands, ten people hurried towards him, local rickshaw drivers, small shop keepers, all exclaiming in delight that their pup was back and in good health. The pup also was happy to meet them again and there was a small tail wagging furiously. They all assured Krishna that they would see to all the pup's needs and that he would be in safe hands now. That day, it was wonderful to realise that even this one street pup had so many well-wishers who were watching over him and his welfare.

As we go about our animal welfare work and meet more and more of these kind and wonderful people, it is heartening to realise that compassion is spreading and the circle of caring people is ever-widening. They are doing sterling work with animals that don't have much chance of getting adopted and getting into a home of their own. But this doesn't really matter as long as caretakers in so many areas of Mumbai are making it their mission in life



to see that these animals are well fed, content and healthy and safe in the locations they call home.

As a footnote, I would like to add, that most of our Managing Committee members are also very much into taking good care of the animals who live in the various localities in which we live. From our Founder **Sudnya Patkar**, to former Presidents **Goodicia Vaidya** and **Fizzah Shah**, to the youngest member **Priya Somaiya**, we are proud to belong to the wonderful group of "Caretakers.

#### Saving the ecology of Dahanu!

Dahanu is a beautiful seafront green zone, surrounded by well established ecosystem of urban and wild life. Humans lived a peaceful, symbiotic life parallel to wild life, but development has taken its toll and animal-human conflicts have started. The Ecosystem has started losing its balance, and if we do not make efforts, in few years we will witness loss of green cover and collapse of this well developed ecosystem. Forests, trees, butterflies, geckos, snakes, birds, reptiles, storks and so on, are found in Dahanu and we must protect it!

Wildlife Conservation & Animal Welfare Association (WCAWA) was born and has flourished in Dahanu by Mr. Dhaval Kansara and Mumbai based Veterinarian Dr. Dinesh Vinherkar who is on Board of IDA India, both started walking towards their vision of saving the wild treasures, and flora & fauna of Dahanu. Today they proudly run this self esteemed NGO WCAWA with more than 200 well educated members along with support of grass root level local people. Today due to excellent network of honorary WCAWA members not a single animal in distress remains without timely aid. Within minutes WCAWA team members reach the spot to rescue animals in distress be it a dog, cat, monkey, hyena, snake, monitor lizard, bat, sea turtle...and you name it!!! All species of animals & plants are cared by WCAWA. Looking at the commitment of this NGO local support is gaining pace. Now Tribal people have started respecting wild animals. Earlier on sighting a reptile people would gather and kill instantly. Now the scenario is changing. Due to efforts of WCAWA people know that killing wild life is a crime, not only as per the law of the country but also against nature and mankind.

Today **WCAWA** volunteers get more than 15 calls per day. Rescue and rehabilitation work done by **WCAWA** is appreciated and supported by the forest department of Dahanu. They also provide legal support to stop crimes against nature. With help of biologists environmentologist, WCAWA members learn about identifying insects, butterflies and their role in the ecosystem, to save their habitat!

This is a positive beginning but plenty yet needs to be done, requiring work force, equipments, funds and willingness to devote time for the cause.

#### Vision:

**WCAWA** has big dreams to make Dahanu a haven for wildlife, a tourist attraction for its hospitality towards nature. It is a dream of **Mr. Dhaval Kansara and Dr. Dinesh Vinherkar** that people from all over world should come to see the Butterfly Park, Reptile Breeding Center, Wildlife rescue & Treatment Centre, wildlife Research, Awareness & Information Center, Bird Identification and Information Park, open aviaries and walk through bird gardens, India's first Sea Turtle Rescue, Treatment and rehabilitation center, besides a Turtle Survival Park where people will able to see all sweet water and marine turtles of India and have an opportunity to get information about them.



Tribal people from Dahanu should get a global platform to showcase their tribal ethics and skills. They can use their artistic skills to be self sufficient.

#### Wildlife and Seaturtle Rescue and Rehabilitation Center run by WCAWA.

WSRRC is presently under Dahanu Forest Department in their premises. It all started when 2 sea turtles found on Bordi beach in severely dehydrated condition with injuries on flippers. WCAWA members acted fast, informed forest department, made a pit and with a plastic paper developed a small pond and those two olive ridley sea turtles got a home. Dr. Dinesh Vinherkar was specially called from Mumbai for treatment of these turtles and thus started a long association. Now many reptiles, injured, beaten or accidently injured wild life, come to this center, get treated and are released back to the wild. As rescue calls increased day by day, under Dr. Dinesh Vinherkar's guidance further changes in the basic equipment were made...and today's center took shape. Today there are two big & two small ponds for injured sea turtles, one examination room equipped with surgical adjustable table which can be used for most wild animals of leopard size, autoclave, fridge, surgical instruments and medicines for first aid ready for 24x7.

In last 3 years **WCAWA** has saved innumerable sea turtles injured due to fishing nets, propellers of fishing boats, victims of oil spill, shell damage and so on. With rescue of 5 sea turtles in 2012, in 2014 **WCAWA** successfully treated 21 sea turtles out of 26 critically ill injured ones, in record time and released most of them back in mother sea with great success. Without **WCAWA** these turtles would have lost their life but today they have gone with good health back to sea. The good news is that **IDA India's Fizzah Shah** has donated to them a 4-wheel drive ambulance-cum-rescue van for speedy Rescue and transport of injured wildlife and other animals, in memory of her loving husband **Navanitlal Shah**.

#### Future plans:

There is a tremendous need to make this center further equipped for example:

- Sea turtle tank water filtration / recycling plant for better utilization of water resources.
- Specially made fiber plastic hospital tanks for individual turtle care and management.
- Fully automated biomedical laboratory to evaluate blood samples of ill wild animals.
- X-ray and sonography machines for special investigative procedures.
- Deep Freezer for food storage

This centre will take care of all orphaned wild babies. They will be cared and helped to grow, before rehabilitating them in the wild with minimum human contact, to keep their wild imprint intact.

#### A. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 1. Method of accounting and Revenue Recognition:

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost basis and have been prepared in accordance with the applicable Accounting Standards and are on accrual basis unless otherwise stated.

#### 2. Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Fixed Assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation on fixed assets has been provided on written down value at the rates specifically stated against the respective asset in the schedule of fixed assets.

#### 3. Investments

Investments are stated at cost of acquisition in compliance with AS 13 issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India and are held in the name of the Trust.

#### 4. Life Membership and Admission Fees

Patron membership fees and Life membership fees are credited to the Corpus Fund of the Trust on the date of admission.

#### 5. Expenditure on the objects of the Trust

The expenses incurred on salary, medicines, surgeons' operating charges and other establishment expenses attributable to various objectives of the Trust have been allocated accordingly and shown separately as 'Expenditure on the Objects of the Trust'.

#### 6. Foreign Currency Transactions

Foreign currency transactions are recorded on initial recognition in the reporting currency by applying to the foreign currency amount the exchange rate prevailing at the date of transaction.



#### **B. NOTES TO ACCOUNTS**

- 1. The Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India are not mandatorily applicable to charitable trusts. However, they are complied, to the extent possible.
- 2. During the year, no provision is made for contribution towards the Public Trust Administration Fund as the Trust is of the opinion that it is covered under the Notification No. BPT 1376 (170) (b) VI dated 30.06.1977, which exempts from payment of contribution to the Public Trust Administration Fund all public trusts, which are exclusively established for the purposes of medical relief or veterinary treatment of animals.
- 3. Dog Kennels / sheds for Hospital at Deonar: The Trust has incurred expenditure on the construction of the temporary sheds for hospital / dog kennel at Deonar, Mumbai. The Trust has carried out the construction of the said sheds on the land owned by the BMC under the directions of the Hon'ble Mumbai High Court and documentation of the licensing of the land on which the said construction has been carried out, is in process.
- 4. Balance of amount receivable and payable are as per books of account and are subject to confirmation, reconciliation and adjustment, if any.
- 5. No provision for Income Tax / Deferred Tax Asset / Liability, Fringe Benefit Tax is considered necessary.
